Paragraph 1

The public typically defines "violent media" as only those television shows, films, and video games that include graphic images of blood, but media violence researchers also include products without such images. Violent media are those that describe or **depict** characters intentionally harming other characters who want to escape from violence. Thus, even children's video games in which there is no blood frequently include violence. A recent study adds critical evidence on the issue of the potential aggression-rich effects of violent video games. First, <u>it</u> confirms that habitually playing violent video games leads to increases in physical aggression some months later in children and adolescents, like those who do not play violent video games. Second, it shows the background reasons by which violent video games can lead to long-term changes in aggressive personality. These findings also contradict another popular alternative hypothesis: gamers who invest in games are more at risk than gamers who use games as a hobby. The results reveal that both the physical and mental health problems linked to games depend on the child's psychological investments in these games rather than pathological gaming.

Paragraph 2

Distance education is clearly different from regular education in terms of a student's or teacher's physical presence. But what does that mean, exactly? For the most part, it translates into increased freedom for both learners and educators, but it also requires higher degrees of discipline and planning to successfully complete the course of study. The enhanced freedom of remote learning is most clearly seen in the fact that students can choose courses that **fit** their schedules and resources. Teachers can do the same as well. And in the case of digital learning, students can also choose the location and teaching styles that best suit their needs. The flip side of freedom, however, is the discipline required to make the most of the lessons. Students need to self-motivate in order to actually get the work done, especially in systems that don't require them to be present in some specific time or place. Teachers also need to be better organized with contingencies should their students need additional explanation, again especially if they are not teaching live and able to "read the room." In certain cases, however, distance learning is not just required, but the best possible option. There are times when the advantages of remote education really have a chance to shine.

Universities which offer the chance of professionalization in specific social and scientific fields are institutions of higher education. Their main objectives are to increase knowledge over a wide field through original thought and research and its extension by the teaching of students. Such societies existed in the ancient world, especially in Greece and India. However, the origin of the university as we know it today lies in medieval Europe, the word "universitas" being a contraction of the Latin term for corporations of teachers and students organized for the promotion of higher learning. The earliest bodies to become recognized under this description were at Bologna and Paris in the first half of the 12th century. Oxford, which is one of the most popular universities in the world, was founded by an early **migration** of scholars from Paris, and Cambridge began with a further migration from Oxford. Other universities sprang up all over Europe from the 14th century onwards.
